


Continuous line drawings

Continuous line drawings are when you draw something without taking your pen off of the paper. It means that you have to go over some of the lines you have already drawn to get back to a certain place in your drawing.



Observation

Observation means to look very closely and focus on what is in front of you. In this unit we will be drawing from observation which means using our eyes to look carefully at the objects and drawing exactly what we see.

Learning Intentions:

- ❑ I can draw from my fingertips, my wrist, my elbow, my shoulder, my body.
- ❑ I can make a drawing using a continuous line for a minute or two.
- ❑ I can draw from observation for a few minutes at a time.
- ❑ I can make different marks with different drawing tools.
- ❑ I have explored how water affects the pen, and explored how I can use a brush to make new marks.
- ❑ I can make choices about which colours I'd like to use in my drawing.
- ❑ I have seen the work of an artist and listened to how the artist made the work. I have been able to share how I feel about the work.
- ❑ I can talk about what I like in my drawings, and what I'd like to try again
- ❑ I can take photographs of my artwork

Project: Snail Drawings

Snail drawings are made using chalk on black paper. The colours can be blended and smudged together to make an interesting effect on the paper. We will also experiment with the types of lines that we are drawing - including broken lines, curly lines, thick line and thin lines.
