<b>impact</b>	The effect that someone has and the difference they make.
<b>legacy</b>	The lasting impact of a person's actions and how they are remembered.
<b>significance</b>	The importance of a person or event.
<b>NHS</b>	The NHS stands for the National Health Service, a free health service created in 1948.
<b>Crimean War</b>	A war fought between 1853 and 1856 in the Crimea, an area in the south of Russia at the time (now part of Ukraine).
<b>commemorate</b>	To remember, celebrate and show respect to someone or something.
<b>Windrush Generation</b>	The people who came to Britain from the Caribbean to live and work from 1948.
